

At Sywell CE Primary School, we believe that reading is not only a fundamental skill that children need to acquire, but an important experience that they should have daily exposure to. There are many skills in reading that need to be taught explicitly and we enable this through taught reading sessions, however reading for pleasure is also an important aspect of reading that we wish our children to value. As a school, we put reading at the forefront of all that we do and we actively encourage children to become individuals who enjoy reading.

We have created a reading spine to work alongside our writing curriculum to enable children to have constant exposure to high quality texts from a range of genres. The reading spine spans across all of the primary year groups and is designed to be progressive in both difficulty and in the range of genres and content that children are exposed to, as well as providing consistency and links in terms of revisiting authors. We hope that by providing a reading spine, then children will be inspired to read other texts written by that author or to read books based on the same genre or theme. The reading spine books are texts which we feel the children should become familiar with in their class across the 2 years so that we can bind our community together by building a collection of stories that everyone knows and enjoys. We want children to leave our school with a knowledge of a variety of rich texts which they understand and enjoy. Please note that while these texts are read together in school and very much promoted, other texts are also utilised and shared throughout the two-year cycle based on teachers' choice and judgement.

The reading spine for Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 consists of 'The Super 6' which are fiction texts and 'The Fantastic 5' which are poetry texts.


